Catskill Art Space features situated personhood exhibit

'Once Upon a Trout' Livingston Manor Trout Parade June 10

Jennifer Coates and David Humphrey fuse heterogeneous ideas into a single image; crashing historical and contemporary themes into each other to draw out hidden longings, anxieties and perspectives. The married couple each uses protagonists and locations to dramatize the vicissitudes of situated personhood. Coates pulls figures and place from images from the canons of art history, while Humphrey finds sources on walks through urban, corporate, domestic and rural settings that he documents with casual iPhone snaps. There is a collage sensibility at play in the artists' work as well; sources and references from a variety of contexts and historical eras cavort and fuse in unlikely ways. Both employ many painterly schemas at the same time - using different



modes of representation as protagonists in themselves. For their presentation at CAS, the artists will have use of their respective galleries, coming together for a collaborative exhibition in the central gallery.

The Franklin Stage Company (FSC), 25 Institute Street, Franklin, Delaware County's renowned classical summer theater, announces its 27th season - June 30 through Aug. 20.

The season opens with David Lindsay-Abaire's comedy "Good People," a play about trying to make the American dream a reality, from June 30 - July 16 with five shows per week.

FSC will present "A Palo Seco Flamenco Dance Company" directed by Rebeca Tomás July 21-23. A Palo Seco has been described as employing "lightning fast footwork."

The next weekend, July 28-30, FSC will feature a return engagement of Julian Fleisher and Band. Fleisher brings his four-piece band who perform both original and tunes from the Great American Songbook.

FSC's final production of the season is a world premiere play by Kyle Bass, which FSC commissioned in 2022. Set at the start of the American Civil War. Toliver and Wakeman dramatizes the experiences of two actual historic characters who lived locally. Toliver Holmes was a young black man born into slavery in Virginia who escaped to New York, changed his name to avoid

Franklin Farmers' Market opens for the summer season Sunday, May 28, in the village of Franklin on Institute Street. a n d d e s serts. aires, craftsmen, and farmers on the lawn of Chapel Hall, which was built in the 1850s as part of the Delaware Literary Institute. A half century later, this threestory post-and-beam Greek Revival became the temple of the Free and Accepted Masons, Lodge #562. For the last quarter century, it has housed the Franklin Stage Company, offering free professional theater. The entire village of Franklin is on the National Historic Registry, and a self-guided walking tour is available. It is situated along state Highway 357, part of the historic Catskill/Susquehanna Turnpike. which in the early 1800s was a main route from the Hudson River landings to the western frontier on the Susquehanna River.

The 136th Delaware County Fair is expected to be back to full swing this year, so plan your vacation to include **Aug. 14-19** in **Walton**, for the best agricultural fair in New York state.

You won't find a better value



than the Delaware County Fair. There will be **1200-1500 live animals** on the grounds and being shown throughout the week. Enjoy **tractor and truck pulls**, over **150 vendors**, **live music** every day, and a dual concert on Saturday - all this and more for a \$10 daily admission, and children 12 and under are free. **Free parking** on the fairgrounds every day.

If you plan to be at the fair for more than one day, take advantage of the **season pass - \$20**. Older adults (55+) can enjoy everything the fair has to offer for a \$5 ticket on Thursday.

Everyday events include **Mr. Scribbles**, a caricature artist, and the **kangaroo-petting** tent where folks can be up close to and even hold little baby joeys. New this year are **Robin's Heavenly Birds** aviary, and a **sand sculpture** exhibit near the Ag Awareness exhibit. Come see what is made from the sand throughout the week.

If you or your children are artistic, the fair has an **art show** that all can enter. Bring your paintings, drawings, sculptures, photographs and more to the Art Show building Saturday, Aug. 12 - then come back to see if your piece has earned a ribbon! Additionally, entries for **baked and canned goods**, and **quilting and needlework projects** will be judged in the Grange Barn will be in the running to win ribbons, too.

The Curtis Lumber Entertainment Court schedule includes an exciting lineup of new and former acts to the tent.

Buffalo Barfield, Illusionist David Garrity, and Cowboy Circus will be back with shows all week at the tent across from Gate A. This year, **Randy's Nashville** Sound featuring Walton's own Randy Hulse will pick up sev-

There will be different bands every night all week. **The Driftwoods**, a country band, will appear Monday night at 7:30; Wednesday, enjoy blues and southern rock by **The Nate Gross Band. The Beadle Brothers** return Thursday with their highenergy concert featuring current country. Friday, a new addition, the **Lazy II Band** will appear with a country and classic rock concert. Saturday, **BJ Hendrickson Music** returns at 7-10 p.m. at the court.

Tuesday is the **karaoke contest** for youth and juniors at 4 p.m., adults at 7 p.m. Then Saturday, the tent will host the karaoke finals for both divisions at 1 p.m. with **Northernstar Productions**. Everyone is welcome, so come to the tent to sign up and show your talent.

Monday, fans will enjoy the first night of the fair's traditional **demolition derby**, starting at 7 p.m. There will be another one Friday night at 7 pm., too. Tickets sell out quickly, so get online in early July to get yours.

Tuesday the **Heroes Parade** will feature volunteer fire departments from across the county, and **4H** and other **children's organizations**. **Delaware County fire personnel** will be admitted free with their county-issued ID. **Veterans** are also admitted free, along with active military, Tuesday. As a matter of fact, all **active military in uniform** will be admitted free any day, all week. Grandstand admission is free for parade watchers.

Dreamland Amusements open Tuesday, with their assortment of carnival rides for all ages. There will be a wristband deal for discounted rates, and the **annual bike giveaway** is scheduled for Tuesday for children who register.

Wednesday, the featured event at the grandstand is the **NYTPA Tractor Pull**; Thursday's schedule shows the gas and diesel **Street Legal 4x4 Truck Pulls**. Saturday morning, enjoy the **Mod or Altered Trucks, HOT Farm, and Out of Farm**, big tractors (11,000 lb.) will pull. It's a fun run with amazing examples of power.

You can find 4H animal show **competition** throughout the week. A detailed schedule of horse shows and other animal shows will be available on the website. There are horse shows every day in the horse show ring. The newly dedicated Tom Newman Memorial Horse Pull will be Friday night in the horse show ring. Tom was instrumental in bringing horse pulls to the fair and a staunch supporter of all horse competition at the fair. This tribute by the Horse Pullers Association will commemorate his contributions. Friday morning, the pony pull can be observed free of charge on the main track. The Saturday night concert returns this year with two great acts in one evening on The Delaware National Bank of Delhi stage. "River of Dreams - A Billy Joel Tribute" takes the stage at 6:30 p.m., followed by "The Ultimate Journey Experience by Legend" at 8:30. See both concerts for a \$10 grandstand fee! The parking lot now has gravel roadways to help the traffic flow off the fairgrounds.



Hancock boasts numerous scenic hiking trails, including Jensen's Ledges, on Bouchoux Brook Road. Jensen's Ledges, locally called "The Ledges" is challenging even for advanced hikers, but leads to expansive views of the Upper Delaware River valley. The Finger Lakes Trail and Rock Rift Rail Trail and Fire Tower, located adjacent to the Cannonsville Reservoir just outside the town of Hancock in the town of Tompkins, provide challenging and easy hikes. 

Go to the Mountains

By Peter Manning

"Doctors say go to the mountains" reads an old ad from the New York, Ontario & Western Railway. Pitching the Catskills as "a region of absolute health at a moderate cost," this ad hints at the competitive economic climate of the railroads and the booming lodging industry in the latter years of 19th century. And too, the height of the adage that the Catskills are good for what ails you. And while we cannot overstate the profound impact of the railroads on the history of the Catskills, we recognize this era as only a single chapter in the greater and ongoing placedefining narrative. The Catskills will always be good for what ails you, and the infrastructure of the railroads will continue to play a vital role.

With narrative comes motion and story, as well as spatial connectivity. Migration from congested city to peaceful countryside, as clean water flows in the opposite direction.

Whatever daily grind, stuffy office, cacophonous din, or latest crisis - indeed whatever kryptonite may be nipping at your heels, there's a phone booth up ahead to jump into and become transformed. Beginning with Rip Van Winkle and running through the grand hotels and the smaller boarding houses, family farm vacations and dude ranches, ski chalets and second homes, short-term rentals and campgrounds, and day trips - all these are expressions in the overall theme that going to the Catskills has the cure for you. Even with the pandemic and the primacy of its "push-factor" dynamic of leaving the city, there is the cherished reward of coming to the Catskills. And that we can't quite put a finger on this magnetism is itself the allure and driving essence. Not quite sure what it is, but it doesn't matter: we need it. All these common threads of Catskills history - as they may be learned of through reading books or having experiences in the landscape - provide us with touchstones to which we can reconnect, reimagine, and even turn to the future with proactive and positive attitudes. There is always fresh inspiration to be found in discovering pieces of the puzzle in the landscape. There are puzzles that have become undone and new ones that need to be put together. In the case of old railroads, it's often both. When an abandoned railroad line remains in single, public ownership as a linear right of way, the revitalization process - be it for a tourist train or a rail trail - is usually more straightforward. The Catskill Scenic Trail, the Ashokan Rail Trail and the Delaware and Ulster Railroad are great success stories. But when an old railbed resides on a patchwork of public and privately owned parcels, the revitalization work will typically require elevated levels of dedication and a strong, long-term vision. And then there are road and stream crossings. It's almost as if a new railroad company needs to be formed. Well, in similar fashion, this is what has taken place for the Hunter Regional Trail in Greene County. Through the persistent efforts of a partnership that includes

local government, NYSDEC, NYCDEP, Greene County Soil & Water, nonprofit organizations, businesses, state legislators, volunteers and landowners, the 11-mile Hunter Regional Trail is steadily taking shape. With three sections now completed, the vision to connect the village of Hunter with Kaaterskill Falls is another step closer to reality.

On Earth Day, a large group gathered to celebrate the opening of a new, 90-foot pedestrian bridge, which crosses a Schoharie Creek tributary and adds another three-quarters of a mile of rail trail. The new section extends the western end of the trail from Dolan's Lake closer to the Huckleberry Multi-Use Trail, a two-mile section centered on Tannersville and reaching east to the Kaaterskill Rail Trail that connects the Mountain Top Historical Society with Kaaterskill Falls (1.7 miles).

Strolling along the old railbed after Saturday's ceremony, I was influenced by a strong sense of appreciation. All the work that went into the old berm under our feet took on a renewed respect, made possible by present-day teamwork and commitment. Restoration of this resource reconnects people with the Catskills. What's more is that this section of trail will be ADA accessible, further reinforcing a direct connection with former Camp Jened, once located where the rail trail meets Ski Bowl Road (see photo). And the connections will continue. With just about everyone arriving by car, this trail will serve vital needs for nonmotorized circulation on the Mountaintop. The motivation to connect the village of Hunter with Kaaterskill Falls and the extended hiking trail system is rooted in and driven by the collective appreciation of place.

The Hunter Regional Trail is an expression of the ever-strengthening regional understanding that economic health not only depends on tourism and recreation, but that it will be sustained by accommodating visitors and preserving wild places - especially peoples' connection with these places. For many, the privilege to live in or visit the Catskills is accompanied by a responsibility to initiate and nourish these connections.

See you in the mountains.



A Natural Arrangement of Remarkable Teeth

Artwork by Helen Quinn



WALTON - This richly textured exhibition combines three of Quinn's bodies of work into an environment of magic, play and transformation.

Quinn's training in textile design, as well as her interest in the flat, richly layered prints and paintings of the Edo period in 19th century Japan, inform the Circus Rorschach and Totems painting series on view. In these brilliantly hued, complex works, Quinn deploys a combination of screen printing, gouache, watercolor, pastels and ink on paper to create compositions of symmetrically stacked and overlapping curvilinear shapes.

The Circus Rorschach series began as portraits of different stops on the 7 train in Queens but, for Quinn, has developed into something different. These paintings, meticulously constructed abstractions, allow for an articulation of memory and perceptions of fleeting moments: colorful phantoms of her daily commute. Having left a more representational approach behind, they have acquired the feel of modern illuminated manuscripts: ciphers of a time, place and people assembling and disassembling from view. In Quinn's sculpture work, her longtime interest in animal mastheads of Viking ships shaped the series of animal heads that peer at us from the walls. They were begun as an instinctive response to the world's events beginning in

2020. For the artist, the idea that a natural or supernatural force could guide a ship - or one's life - through its storms gave them their power. Moreover the spirit of a ship was embodied in the masthead; it gave a face or personality, as well as protection, to the vessel as a temporary home.

Constructed in many layers of wire, papier-mache, lightweight clay, and paint, the animals appear to be emerging from the walls, lifelike and dynamic. In this exchange between the artist and materials, and now the human and animal, these artworks inhabit a space between talisman, totem and portrait-posing the question of who is peering into whose world.

Quinn lives and works in Queens. She has shown her work internationally including the Czech Republic and Norway. She holds a BFA from the Rhode Island School of Design and an MFA from Cranbrook Academy
